## TWO VIEWS OF SENATOR BAILEY

## Fort Worth Record

As before, when Senator Bailey was appointed upon the nomination of coalition with the Waters-Pierce Oil company, the Record has calmly and confidentially awaited the senator's reply to the sensational allegation of the state attorney general.

And, as before the Record's patience and confidence are completely justified.

The amazing feature of the case is that reputable men would lend themselves to such misrepresentation of that intelligent men could be deceived by such a palpable conspiracy. They seem to think that the people are incapable of thought and that Mr. Bailey is a downright idiot, for they accuse him of deliberately and repeatedly denying things which are easily demonstrable.

The people have not forgotten that Pierce represented that his new company was independent of the Standard; that Attorney General Smith and Secretary of State Hardy accepted that representation in good faith; that nothing to the contrary was known until the Missouri prosecution was instituted a little more than a year ago, that under these circumstances it was proper for Mr. Bailey to accept employment from Mr. Pierce or from the Waters-Pierce Oil company if he had seen fit to do so.

The people have not forgotten the legislative investigation of the affair in 1901, which left Mr. Bailey blameless, nor the recent inquiry about the thirteen millions of securities and his complete annihilation of all that slander during six weeks of campaigning in Texas during September and October. And the people now will understand that the utmost of the fraud allegation is that Bailey borrowed some money from Pierce under perfectly proper circumstances and paid the obligations as they were due.

As remarked, the accusers seem to think Bailey is an idiot. They might at least credit him with the common sense not to deny recently, his compensation from the Waters-Pierce company if there were any evidence of such payment, and with the common sense not to give a note to the Waters-Pierce Oil company.

Where is the fool lawyer who would accept a fee with a promissory note? The Record can understand at least, it has come to regard with surprise the persistent misrepresentation of the senator by certain men in Texas whose ambitions have been disappointed by his success and the malice of certain small nature who prefer to believe evil of their fellow men.

Also, it is tolerant of the suspicious disposition of a considerable element of the people who are quick to condemn without proof and especially prone to think ill of public men.

But the Record cannot understand Attorney General Davidson's conduct. If all that he alleges touching Mr. Bailey were true, it would not affect in the least the lawsuit that the state is conducting. It is mere pretense to say that it is desired to prove Standard ownership of the Waters-Pierce by showing that Standard auditors audited the alleged Bailey vouchers for the Standard ownership is confessed and nothing more is required to prove a violation of the law.

Not only that, but the attorney general, after an agreement to go to trial on the merits of the case, introduced new pleadings which he was bound to know would compel the defendant company to ask and obtain a postponement and, pending that motion, he made demand upon the attorneys for the defendant for those alleged vouchers and was careful to give the press a complete inventory of the demand.

Meanwhile, the legislature is to assemble in January, and is due to elect a United States senator on the second Tuesday after organization. The next term of the court will fall in March, and there is no possible way of judicially determining the truth or falsity of the allegations touching Mr. Bailey until after the senatorial election.

If it is not a deliberate attempt to jeopardize Mr. Bailey's election, it is a very stupid piece of business. The whole affair has a rank aspect. It is followed by many intelligent men, as the Record has heretofore pointed out, that the Standard Oil company is trying to destroy the Waters-Pierce company, of which it is a two-thirds owner in order that it be the sole owner of the whole Texas business, and to destroy Senator Bailey, who has made himself especially odious to the monopoly by attempting to regulate pipe lines as common carriers and to prohibit them from transporting their own products, which would compel the Standard to dispose of its pipe lines the chief instrument of its monopoly. The state of Texas is taking no action at all against the Standard although it is known to own competing refineries at Corsicana and Beaumont.

The Records fears that there is much more to learn about this prosecution. Meanwhile it congratulates Senator Bailey upon his vindication and the assurance of his triumphant re-election by the Thirtieth legislature. And the people need not doubt that in his next term of six years he will give the Standard Oil company now come to hate him, which will also furnish the public with new cause to love him.

## WHY SENATOR BAILEY SHOULD BE DEFEATED.

When Attorney General Davidson, in his official capacity, called for documents of the Waters-Pierce Oil company, purporting to involve Senator Bailey, the News realized that this proceeding was an entirely different matter from the former criticism of Mr. Bailey, which had been made by citizens in private life. However, in its desire to be fair, in publishing its policy to prejudice no man's case, and because it seemed that all the facts pertaining to Senator Bailey's relation to the Waters-Pierce Oil company might be developed in the judicial proceeding at Austin, the News refrained at the time from expressing an opinion in the matter.

The attorney general called upon said oil company to produce certain specified vouchers and records. The purpose of this demand, according to the state's pleadings, and the attorney general's subsequent statement, was to establish the facts that the former Waters-Pierce Oil company had not been dissolved and that it is continued by the Standard Oil company. Certain of these alleged vouchers purported to show that H. C. Pierce had drawn money from the Waters-Pierce Oil company to reimburse himself for payments claimed to have been made to J. W. Bailey upon account of Texas cases, and Mr. Jones made by Pierce to Bailey. Certain of the vouchers, according to the notice of the attorney general, appeared to have been audited by the auditor of the Standard Oil company.

Following this notice of the attorney general, Senator Bailey gave out a statement at Washington in which he declared that if there were any vouchers purporting to show that he had received money from the Waters-Pierce Oil company, such vouchers were forged. It seemed to the News that Mr. Bailey's Texas friends had not accurately informed him of the proceedings at Austin. No issue had been joined as between Senator Bailey and the Attorney General. One had written about one thing and the other about a different thing. Again the News waited, in order that the same might be joined. In the meantime, Attorney General Davidson wrote an open letter asking Senator Bailey for what service or purpose he had received the amounts alleged to have been drawn by Pierce from the Waters-Pierce Oil company.

The case against the company had been continued and the chance of an early judicial inquiry lost. At this point the News felt inclined to say that there should be a legislative investigation; that the time for executive statements had passed. Nevertheless it has waited to hear Senator Bailey's rejoinder. This statement on Senator Bailey appears elsewhere. It speaks for itself. In so far as Senator Bailey's eligibility is concerned the News does not deem an investigation necessary. The countercharges made by him (his imputations of witnesses and critics) have not been material as concerns charges against himself. The vital question all along has been as to what he did, and how many matters referred to are of no consequence in so far as they relate to his conduct. He may be judged by his own statement. It is this statement which convinces the News that no investigation is necessary, because it furnishes the reason why the legislature should not elect Senator Bailey.

The News is extremely reluctant to reach such a conclusion in the case of a man of Senator Bailey's brilliant attainments, and it is not unkind of the displeasure it will incur in some quarters by making this declaration. Nevertheless it does not shrink its duty as a public journal. It does not consider Senator Bailey's explanation satisfactory and is convinced that his influence and usefulness have been so badly impaired by the charges against him and his own responses and explanation that the Democracy of Texas should unite upon some other man for the high place which he now holds.

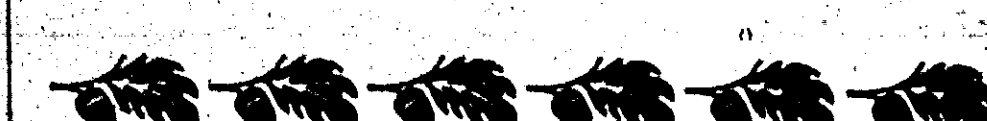

## CARELESSNESS CAUSE

Horrible Accident Result of Some Person's Stupidity.

## DOZEN MEN DROWNED

Twelve of Water Drowned Upon the Unfortunate Mexican, Who Was Caught Like a Rat in a Trap and Perished.

Laredo, Dec. 3.—News has been received in this city from Monterey of a horrible accident which occurred at the Avila mines, and which resulted in the death of twelve Mexicans, miners at work in the shaft, and which might have resulted in the death of many more had it not been that the entire force of men employed in the mine had not commenced their labor for the day. The accident occurred at an early hour in the morning.

According to the best available information the accident was due to the carelessness of somebody in letting a high flow of water into the low level, where the men were working, and while the men were caught like rats in a trap by the immense inflow of water, caused by the opening of a flood gate, and had no chance to escape.

The authorities will make a keen investigation into the accident, and will endeavor to fix the responsibility.

Arthur Houser, a resident of Monterey, confirmed the report. He states that there are a number at the mine, but that they will not go to work, as the pumps are in no condition to pump out the water. Thus far no bodies of the drowned men have been recovered.

The Avila mine is located near Avila, one of the largest mining districts in the state of Durango.

## STATE TESTS.

"Angie, Don't Shoot Me Any More!"

Hazlehurst, Miss., Dec. 3.—With surprising rapidity the prosecution in the case of Mrs. Angie Birdsong completed its evidence Friday. A day and a half had been occupied in presenting the state's witnesses. Two leading points were aimed at by the prosecution. First, it was attempted to show that the youthful defendant was a deliberate, and that she followed her already mortally wounded victim out of his office to his veranda, where she adjusted her revolver, after he had pleaded for mercy, and that with the weapon ready, she fired three more shots at him. The second aim of the prosecution was to prove Dr. Butler's good character.

One of the state's witnesses, Mrs. Nora Garrett, lived in a house across the street from Dr. Butler. She testified that she saw the shooting, both in the office and outside, and that she heard the physician cry, "Angie, don't shoot me any more!" A moment later Dr. Butler exclaimed: "My God, Angie, what will become of you when you get shot?"

The witness said that she herself called to Mrs. Birdsong to stop shooting. The witness said there was no truth in a report that she had informed Mrs. Birdsong of alleged to have been circulated by Dr. Butler. The prosecution went into details about the nature of the physician's wounds, and then rested its case.

The defense immediately called as its first witness the defendant's mother-in-law, Mrs. Birdsong. The latter testified that defendant, after the birth of her last child, had shown signs of insanity, and that these symptoms were repeated about the time of the killing.

The mother-in-law said that Mrs. Garrett, who had called on Mrs. Birdsong, had called on Mrs. Birdsong a few days before the tragedy, and after this visit a departure Mrs. Birdsong remarked that if she found that her son had told ill stories about her she would have to saddle the well, and the mother-in-law said she heard only once during the period the defendant was referred to, and that then the defendant had gone for medicine at witness's request. Other witnesses told of Mrs. Birdsong's attempt at suicide a few days before the shooting.

## WALSH OUTCLASSED.

Abe Attell Wins a Decisive Victory Over Boston Man.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3.—Abe Attell of San Francisco, champion featherweight of the world, Friday night won a decisive battle from Jimmy Walsh of Boston, knocking him off in the eighth round with a straight left to the solar plexus. Walsh regained consciousness a short time after the count of ten and was evidently not badly injured.

Once before, in the eighth round, Attell landed a terrific right on Walsh's jaw, and followed it up with a rush and a rain of blows, and had Walsh going badly when some one from Walsh's corner threw a towel into the center of the ring, and the fight was stopped. Walsh protested and struggled to get at Attell again. After a moment's delay and wrangling over the matter, the fight was resumed. The men went immediately at each other, and Abe soon had his man going badly, and quickly put him out. Attell completely outclassed his opponent.

But for the fact that the charge is made that I have in my possession and am using forged documents, I would not have said this. I would not make any reply to your letter.

My sense of duty to the people of this state now impels me to make public the evidence in my possession relating to that matter, and I herewith give copies of said documents to the press. The documents are not forgeries.

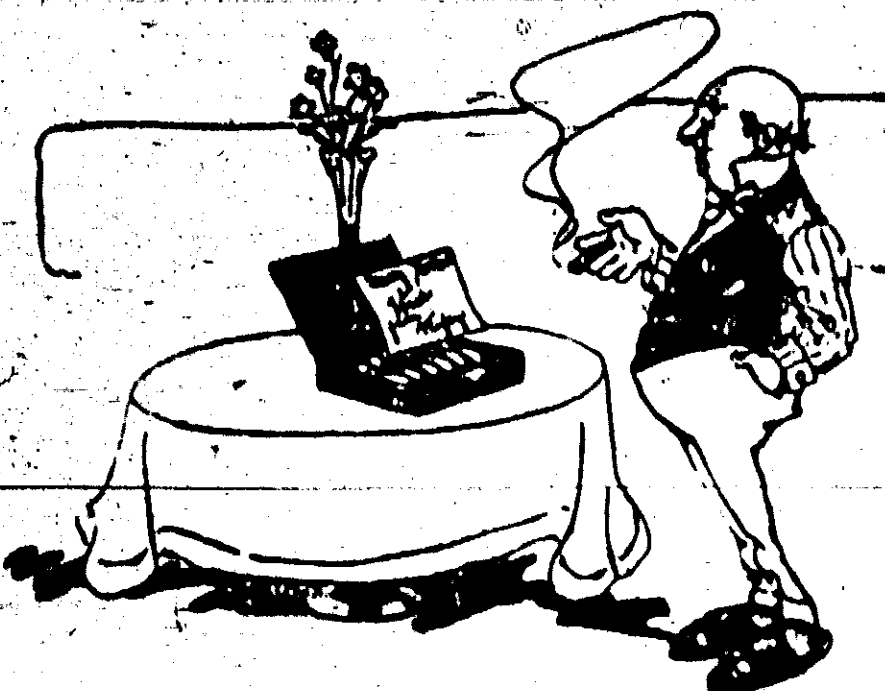

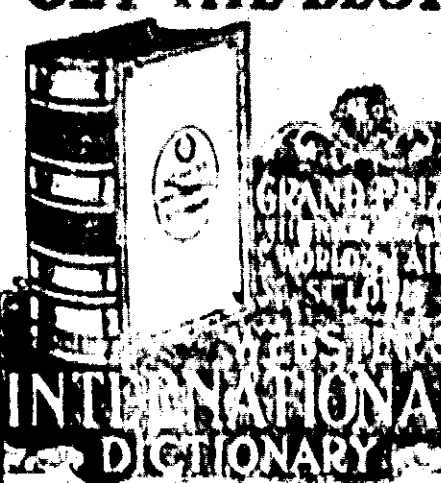

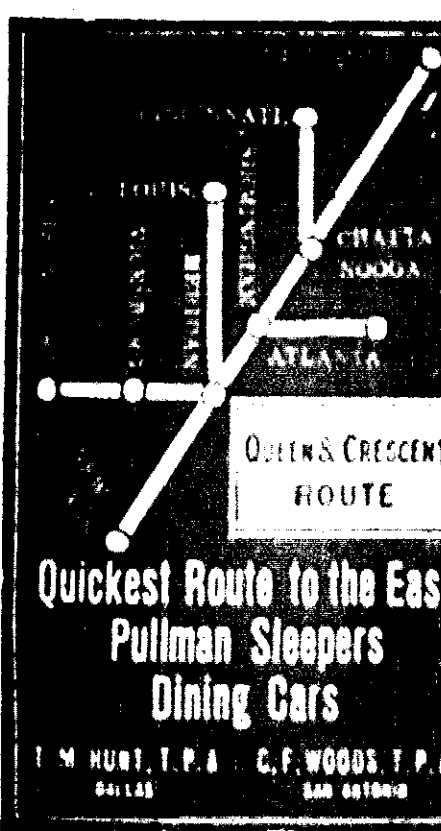
